

## Vermont Commission on the Well-Being of the Legal Profession

### Charge and Designation (Extended)


The Vermont Supreme Court established the Vermont Commission on the Well-Being of the Legal Profession ("Commission") on January 2, 2018. The stated purpose of the Commission was to create a state-wide action plan with specific proposals for the Vermont Supreme Court and its relevant committees to consider. The Commission submitted a State Action Plan to the Vermont Supreme Court on December 31, 2018. The Commission's Charge and Designation specified that it shall be effective through January 15, 2019 unless further extended by the Court.

The Court hereby extends the Charge and Designation for the following reasons, and for the purposes set forth below:

- On an annual basis, beginning in January 2020, the Commission shall meet to review the then-status of the State Action Plan, including progress made regarding the various recommendations included in the Plan.
- On an annual basis, no later than July 1 of each year beginning in the year 2020, the Commission shall submit a written report to the Court summarizing the results of the Commission's annual review of the Plan.
- The appointment of the Commissioners named in the original Charge and Designation shall remain in effect.

This Extended Charge and Designation shall be effective on this date and shall continue until further action by the Court.


